The Winter Reading Challenge, “For the Love of Reading” exceeded expectations, with 12,263 days of reading recorded. The program goal was 10,000 days. This season, we had 762 reading participants, and 120 readers completed the entire challenge. Children, teens, and adults actively participated in the reading challenge.

The Pedal Forward Project is part of Volusia County's Social Workers in Libraries program; adding value to the program by offering tangible support to participants who have demonstrated determination and resiliency for re-entering the workforce but lack reliable transportation. Specifically, the refurbished bicycles give participants a greater sense of self-reliance and independence, and affords them a wider search area for employment. The program also grants greater flexibility for shift availability, minimizes weather exposure, improves the stamina necessary to maintain heavy work schedules for more labor-intensive jobs, and diminishes the community's waste footprint by keeping usable bicycles out of local landfills. In 2024, NEFLIN (Northeast Florida Library Information Network) Board of Directors selected Volusia County Public Library's Pedal Forward Project as the winner of that year's Innovation Award.

#### Recent success stories include:

Mr. Mcelyea was just provided with a Pedal Forward Project bike at the DeLand Regional Library last week. He arrived in Volusia County last Fall and is being helped by members of our great community! Wanting more independence, Mr. Mcelyea is set to meet with Career Source to help him with his resume and the bike will give him the transportation he needs to expand his work search.

Ms. Crutchfield, of Daytona Beach, just received a Pedal Forward Program bicycle from the Social Worker in Libraries initiative. She attends Daytona State College's Fresh Start transitional program with the ultimate goal of becoming a medical assistant. The bicycle will allow her to not only continue her schooling but will afford her the ability to get to job interviews.

Mr. Garza, of DeLand, shared that he was already using a friend's loaner bike to go to work. With the Pedal Forward Project's refurbished bicycle program, he is thrilled to have a bicycle of his own now! He shared with staff that he has been battling cancer for nearly a decade and that the bike will not only help him get to work, but it will just make everything easier for him – mobility around town, getting to appointments, grabbing groceries, and more. He values his independence and very much appreciates the program and wishes to share his appreciation for this project and to its sponsors who make refurbished bicycles a possibility (Notably, repurposed bicycles have been donated by the Sheriff's Department, VOTRAN, and First Presbyterian Church of New Smyrna Beach).

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



### SARAH L. WIEDERHOLT TREASURED VOLUSIA COUNTY PUBLIC LIBRARY YOUTH SPECIALIST



## Recipes from the 50s and 60s



### Chicken à la King

- Ingredients**
- 4 oz. mushroom stems and pieces, drained (reserve liquid)
  - 1 small green pepper, chopped (about ½ cup)
  - ½ cup margarine or butter
  - ¼ tsp. pepper
  - 1½ tsp. instant chicken bouillon
  - 1½ cups milk
  - 1¼ cups hot water
  - 2 cups cut-up cooked chicken or turkey
  - 4 oz. whole pimiento, chopped
  - ½ cup all-purpose flour
  - 1 tsp. salt

- Directions**
- Cook mushrooms and green pepper in margarine over medium heat 5 minutes, remove from heat.
  - Stir in flour, salt, and pepper. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly until mixture is bubbly, remove from heat.
  - Stir in instant bouillon, milk, water, and reserved mushroom liquid. Heat to boiling, stirring constantly. Boil 1 minute.
  - Stir in chicken and pimiento; heat through. Serve over toast, rice, or noodles.



### Mini Pigs in a Blanket

- Ingredients**
- 1 12-14 oz. package of cocktail sausages, patted dry
  - 1½ cups flour
  - 1½ tsp. baking powder
  - 1 tsp. sugar
  - ½ tsp. salt, plus a pinch-separated
  - ½ cup milk
  - 1/3 cup unsalted butter, melted

- Directions**
1. Preheat oven to 400°F, line a sheet pan with a silicone baking mat or parchment paper.
  2. Poke two sets of holes in each cocktail sausage and set aside.
  3. Whisk together flour, baking powder, sugar, and salt. Add milk and butter and stir with a wooden spoon until combined.
  4. On a floured work surface, pat out the dough, and knead it gently if necessary to bring it together. Dust dough with flour and roll into a rectangle with a rolling pin, about an 1/8" thick.
  5. Cut lengthwise strips, about 1" wide. Then cut 2½-3" sections across the strips. You should have about 20 rectangular strips. Combine any dough scraps and repeat with what's left.
  6. Place a cocktail sausage at the end of each strip and roll it to close. Place seam-side down on prepared baking sheet. Repeat until all are assembled.
  7. Bake for 15 minutes or until dough is golden brown.

**Amy Cantley**

West Regional Librarian.



**Amy Cantley** is Volusia County Public Library’s West Regional Librarian and oversees the Deltona Regional Library, DeLand Regional Library, DeBary Public Library, Orange City Public Library, Lake Helen Public Library, and Pierson Public Library.

**VCPL-** How long have you been with Volusia County Public Library?

**AMY-** Seven months now. Seven months. So far, so good. I love it. I'm very happy to be with the system. I was with my previous system for 10 years.

**VCPL-** Which was?

**AMY-** Seminole County Public Library. It was a big decision to make the transition to Volusia County Public Library because I was happy with my previous position there.

**VCPL-** Why did you decide to seek a different opportunity?

**AMY-** I wanted more challenges, more opportunities than what I was going to find in a smaller system. When I decided to make the move to Volusia County, I researched the system for probably a good month and a half before I even applied for the position...My predecessor, now the assistant director, Melissa Reynolds left me with a great region...I'm personally enjoying getting to do the new LaunchPad at DeLand Regional. That's been my big project lately.

**VCPL-** Tell me a little bit more about that.

**AMY-** Our Friends of the DeLand Library group were very generous. At [their] budget time, I asked them to fund numerous programs, and they generously agreed.

**VCPL-** What has the patron reaction been to the addition?

**AMY-** The DeLand Regional team has been great during the process...[they] recognize that this is kind of scary for our patrons, but here's what's coming in its place... the Legacy Lab, all the tech, more classes happening, and how the LaunchPad will serve the community. For me, it's a win-win for the library system, the DeLand Regional branch, and the West region of the county. As for the community, they're getting makerspace services... Overall, they have been very

excited about what's coming. And another thing that I've been thrilled with - is that we've been able to reuse a lot of things from different regions and from the branch itself to try to keep library costs as low as possible. The library's facilities team has been super helpful and very humble about all the help and hard work.

**VCPL-** So, compared to your previous system of employment, what's the main difference between that system and this system?

**AMY-** One of the things that enticed me to come over here is all of the community outreach and community engagement that Volusia County does. I thought that was huge and wanted to be part of that. The social worker program here is a great program.

**VCPL-** Have you always been in library services, or did you start your career doing something else?

**AMY-** I started my career actually rather late. I was a stay-at-home mom. I homeschooled for many years. Before we started homeschooling, I was really involved with my child's school. I was a board member of the PTA. When my child got to about second grade, I found myself waiting for the bus every day and becoming really bored. I had started volunteering with the Seminole County Guardian ad

Litem a couple of years before, and I really enjoyed that role...I thought that I might want to go into legal and become a lawyer, so I went back to school...while I was taking care of my child's education, I was also taking care of my own. It took many years to get through it. I started out as a criminal justice major because I was interested in the parent side of legalities and thought that I might want to be a public defender. So, I was always determined to be broke. (laughs). I was always determined to be a public employee, to be in public service was my focus. By the time I completed my AA ... I went back to my first love of English and thought maybe I'll be a teacher, but I had teacher friends who advised against it. I really wanted to stay in the public education sector, so I started volunteering at my local library branch. I graduated from Rollins in 2014 and was on my way to graduate school at USF. I got hired by Seminole County as a clerk and worked my way up over the years. In 2015, I was working as an assistant librarian for Seminole [County], and I received a cancer diagnosis. That kind of derailed everything for a few years...[but] once I felt better, I finished up my Master's, here we are. The short answer is, professionally, yes, always in libraries, but it's kind of a winding path that got me here.

**VCPL-** Are you from Florida originally?

**AMY-** Yes, born and raised. We live next door to my parents!

**VCPL-** What's been the greatest challenge so far in your position?

**AMY-** I already know the answer to this question...It's the lack of institutional knowledge. I do miss having that institutional knowledge of knowing everyone, of knowing all the ins-and-outs of policies and procedures. Still, I have a great team in the West and have seen that everybody does work together; everybody's very open about helping each other accomplish a common goal.

**VCPL-** Is there anything lacking here? All your comments were very positive.

**AMY-** Oh, I love it here.

**VCPL-** Was there a defining moment that led you to the Volusia County system?

**AMY-** Ultimately, what sold me was a poster presentation I made at last year's FLA [Florida Library Association] Conference on Oral History and Public Libraries. And, I didn't realize it at the time, but I met the Assistant Director there. She brought a Volusia County branch manager over to me and said, "You need to talk to her [me]. We could use this at John H. Dickerson Library!" So, that was one introduction. But I had talked to another library

leader earlier in the day, because Volusia County Library had also delivered a service presentation. I wasn't really looking for other work, but I was talking to this library leader about her presentation, and she was just gushing praise for her library system in Volusia. When I was thinking about leaving [Seminole County], what it finally came down to was that I can't know if everyone is happy there, but I know this person is super happy and has nothing but glowing things to say. And so, it was kind of funny on my first day here to see that staff person greeting me! I laughed and said, "I know you." She's like, "You do?" I replied, "You're the reason I'm here!" She's like, "What?" I reminded her of our conversation at the conference and how we talked for a long time. I said, "It was your energy and your excitement over this library system that gave me what I was looking for in my next job."

**VCPL-** Anything else you want to say?

**AMY-** I think our Social Worker in Libraries program is super special. It's something that people would never think about as a library offering. And, I think for library workers, when you're working with patrons and seeing need,

seeing people in crisis...having the social worker program available takes some of that distress away from staff... knowing that we can put them in immediate contact with someone trained to help. I find that to be such a special program.

**VCPL-** Thank you for your time, and I wish you much success in your new position.  
**AMY-** Thank you! Glad to be here.


